The staff at Prep appreciate that all children are precious and ensure that the sense of a school family is deeply entrenched in



St Andrew's Prep continues in the same spirit that motivated its founders so long ago. It has taught generations of boys the virtues of self-reliance, determination and comradeship.







St Andrew's Prep draws boys from across the country and the African continent. Currently there are 245 children from Pre-Primary (Grade 000) to Grade 7, of which 73 are boarders. Our school has more boys in our boarding school programme than any other primary school in South Africa. Its roots remain firmly in the Eastern Cape. A significant number of boys come from farming stock and many families have sent their sons to St Andrew's for five generations and more.

The UK Old Preppie Scholarship

St Andrew's Prep is respectfully seeking donations towards the support of a scholarship to be called the **UK Old Preppie Scholarship**.

It is our vision that this scholarship will be awarded to three boys over the next three years who show outstanding academic, sporting and cultural potential. The scholarship will cover full tuition and boarding fees for the full four years at Prep.

We are confident that the prestige of awarding the UK Old Preppie Scholarship, synonymous with the Boxer Scholarship at St Andrew's College, will further increase the status of Prep as a leading boys' school in Southern Africa

In order to accommodate three boys (the first boy starting in Grade 4 in 2015, the next boy in 2016 and the last boy in 2017), a total of £88 000 is required.

We are fortunate to have already received donations and pledges from Old Preppies living in the United Kingdom totalling £43 000 towards this scholarship.

We are therefore respectfully seeking an additional £45 000 in order to commence with this programme in 2015.

We are asking for donations and pledges, both large and small, from Old Preppies resident in the UK to contribute to our strategy of ensuring the sustainability of Prep as a leading preparatory school.

Quotes from recent donors to the Prep Scholarship and Bursary Fund

Mr Bryan Gransden (Old Preppie, 1947) Canada

I have been asked to write a few words in commendation of St Andrew's Preparatory School as Prep continues its efforts to raise funds for its scholarship programmes.

From my perspective as an ex-Preppie, Prep is one of the best preparatory schools in the English-speaking world, having more than lived up to its Founding Prayer that "it stands always for all that is true, noble, lovely and of good report" and "that we and others may so gain from its life that many may bless Thee for the day when it was founded and that its work may be extended and continued for generations to come....".

I arrived at Prep at the end of the Second World War, having missed school altogether for a period by virtue of the war and subsequently having attended a series of schools in Egypt and India which left me far behind academically.

I was lovingly received by Prep and its wonderful staff, of whom I remember in particular Mr Ted Rivett-Carnac, who came to Fairlawn in 1946 with a chestful of medals from the war. Mr Rivett-Carnac was only one of the many Old Preppies who served, and to whom a total of forty honours and decorations for distinguished service were granted. At this time South Africa enjoyed an excellent reputation internationally, as did the Prime Minister, Field Marshall Jan Christiaan Smuts, one of the founders of the United Nations.

The Prep teachers very quickly turned me around and, before I even knew it, I advanced quickly in most of my classes. My best-remembered academic achievement at Prep was to earn its Latin holiday by memorizing every Latin verb in Kennedy's Latin Primer. I learned the social intricacies of the English-speaking world, its music, songs and traditions as though Grahamstown was situated in an English county rather than in rural South Africa. I learned to play rugby and cricket, scoring a six in my first game! I also read every book in the Prep library during the period that I was there.

As I write this piece, so many memories return. Every morning at Prep, the roll was called, the boys answering by stating their names in the sequence of their seniority, the "Standing Order". I do not remember the name of the boy at the top, only my position in the Standing Order - "....Williams, Gransden, Ward....", and that Ward, who came from Benoni, was known as Benoni Ward! One can never forget the half-term picnic, when the old cart was produced, loaded with goodies and dragged to the country. A tradition of the picnic was to make toffee with condensed milk and golden syrup in the same frying pans in which the meat was cooked!

In 1948 with the election of the Nationalist Party and the introduction of apartheid, South Africa quickly became a pariah state, and private schools such as St Andrew's College and Prep were confronted with Dr Verwoerd's Bantu Education Act, passed in order to enforce an inferior system of education for non-European boys. That the administrators of Prep and other private schools passed a resolution to provide equitably for the education of all South Africans, whatever the difficulties, speaks well of the School. Now that a democratic government rules, Prep has an opportunity to redress any and all grievances of the apartheid era by providing scholarships for deserving boys.

It is generally recognised that a happy childhood leads on to a happy life. In my experience, thanks in large part to Prep, this has been true. Andrew La Trobe (Old Preppie, 1978) United Kingdom

By various twists and turns I ended up starting at Pre-Prep in the Fairlawn buildings in 1972. My three brothers were at school at St Aidans, but the good Jesuit Fathers did not offer sub A and sub B pre-school, so the plan was for me to complete these two years with the "Hanglicans", and then move across to join the "fish & chips" bunch in Std 1. Sadly St Aidan's closed its doors at the end of 1973, but to my everlasting gratitude my parents took the decision to leave me continuing my journey at Prep, whilst my brothers took up at Kingswood in 1974.

For someone who wasn't so very obviously pre-ordained to be a Preppie, I have never felt anything other than a sense of overwhelming belonging to the Prep community. Like the very first Preppies, and many other generations that have passed through the school so happily, I started out in the care of a Mullins. In my case it was Mrs Sheila Mullins, who provided such a wonderful nurturing environment for those on the first rung of their education ladder. Not long after came Mrs Joan Bromhead, who did so much to instil in us a sense of adventure and the enjoyment of outdoor pursuits. After them came a long line of wonderful educationalists at both Prep and College, but looking back much of my life and those of my fellow Preppies, was made possible by the extraordinary start Prep provided in those very early years of our lives.

That seems to be increasingly reinforced by research from educationalists - that our earliest years are the most critical to our long term ability to achieve our true potential. This is the great opportunity: for Prep to be a home for so many more talented children, whose lives (and those of their community) can be transformed by Prep's inspirational and nurturing education.

I have a photograph of my 1972 class, and when I look across all the little faces of my classmates (of whom many remain close friends), it's very encouraging as to what they have achieved as individuals, and what we as a group have managed to contribute in our respective walks of life and communities. This is the great power of Prep, and why I'm so enthused by the idea of another group of Preppies combining in support of future generations of children who need our support to join the Prep family.
